




Reserve Captain Charles Lindbergh is a Medal of Honor recipient for his solo flight across the Atlantic Ocean to Paris in 1927.






Hollywoood actor Jimmy Stewart joined the military as a pilot during World War II, and he retired as a brigadier general in the Air Force Reserve.







Air Force Citizen Airmen flew the C-123 Provider in the 1960s and 70s.





Air Force Citizen Airmen from Travis Air Force Base, California, helped set 45 new world records in April 2015 in this C-5M Super Galaxy.




Air Force Reserve Lieutenant Colonel Mike Brill holds the record for the most flying hours in the F-16 Fighting Falcon.




In 2014, Air Force Citizen Airmen used "Slick" C-130s like these to airdrop food and water to refugees on Sinjar Mountain in Iraq.




The Air Force Reserve flies the E-3 Sentry airborne warning and control system (AWACS) aircraft, from Tinker Air Force Base, Oklahoma.






