

AFR HISTORY

Since its inception in 1948, the Air Force Reserve has been a part of every conflict since the Korean War. From 1950 through 1980, it aided in the Berlin and Cuba crises as well as the Vietnam War, implemented the Total Force concept and began flying modern aircraft alongside Active Duty, and modernized their weapons system inventory with the addition of KC-10s, A-10s, F-4s, and F-16s. During OPERATIONS DESERT SHIELD/STORM in the 1990's, more than 23,500 Reservists were mobilized. In the post-9/11 era, Reservists contributed to Afghan missions and the Global War on Terror, and supported Ukraine and Levant operations. Further modernization is underway with the addition of KC-46s and F-35s to the weapons systems inventory.
